Everyone at Hall Mead is behind you! Mr Swan, Mr Morritt and Mr Cole will also be attending to show our Hall Mead support.







- Her name was Ethel Dickens
- The school opened in 1960 with one building and one year group



#### How the Houses got their name?





 Chapman gets its name from the first Head Boy at Hall Mead.

- When the school opened, Miss Dickens wanted a Head Boy at the school even though there was just one year group.
- Kevin Chapman was voted as Head Boy by the year group and he was voted each year for 7 years.
- He went on to be come a teacher and taught locally for his entire career.

- Talbot gets its name from the link to Waltham Abbey.
- Talbot is the name of a now extinct hunting dog.
- This dog also forms the main part of the Hall Mead logo

- Waltham House gets its name from this link to the Abbey and also explains the link to the Talbot dog.







#### **Achievement Point Update**




Mr Morritt, Head of Waltham/Head of Year 11, has responsibility for our school Achievement Point system.
